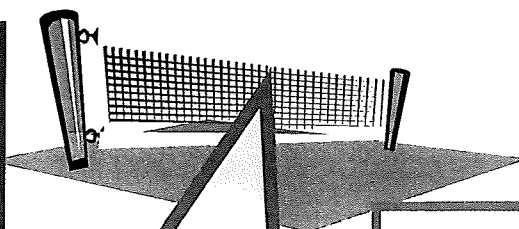

The item below was presented to Council as a point of discussion on regional amalgamations. The points contained within this discussion paper accurately reflect the views of the Carnamah Shire Council on the question of local government reform in rural and remote areas of Western Australia. Council believes that before any changes are initiated to Shire boundaries or before any amalgamations take place, that there needs to be evidence that there will be no financial disadvantage to the community and that the community should be given the opportunity to vote on any proposed changes.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT COUNTRY REFORM

BACKGROUND

As the Country Local Government Reform Forum considers the various models that may be applied to reform in the rural and remote areas of the State, it is appropriate to establish some basic principles which should apply as a prerequisite to implementing change.

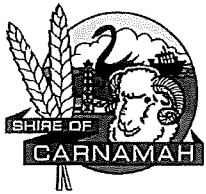
The uncertainty that has prevailed within Local Government with respect to the State Government's plans to reform the sector since 2009 has been to the detriment of Local Government throughout Western Australia. The continuously shifting position of the State Government with respect to amalgamations/boundary changes has created ambiguity, confusion and despondency within the sector. This uncertainty has had a deleterious impact on the medium and long term planning for individual Shires and has compromised what should be a strong cooperative working relationship between the sector and the State Government.

Investigations into possible mergers have mostly concluded:

- That there is little to be achieved through amalgamation;
- That there are significant transition costs involved (which will have to be funded by the ratepayer or taxpayer or both!);
- There are probable reductions in grant funding over time; and
- There is a diminishment of social and economic capital in the smaller centres that lose their local seat of local government through being subsumed into a larger entity.

The current metropolitan review initiated by the State Government, is causing significant disquiet, in both metropolitan and country areas. This is especially due to the fact that it seems in most cases communities will not be given the opportunity to exercise the poll provisions of the *Local Government Act* before boundaries are changed.

There is a prevailing view that the State Government will target country areas after the implementation of what may be effectively forced amalgamations in the metropolitan area. ***The impact of forced mergers in the country would arguably be more serious than those of the metropolitan area as local councils are generally major employers and hold together the social fabric of their communities.*** The creation of one Local Government to replace several separate entities will without doubt, by design or by default, centralise activities and priorities to a main centre. Towns that previously had a seat of Local Government will be adversely impacted from both an economic and social perspective.

The creation of "Place Managers" and a token Local Government presence will never adequately compensate for the retention of individual local governments with their collective dedicated career staff and readily accessible elected members.

The "appetite" for Local Government reform espoused by the State Government is lacking logic given that the sector does not cost the State Government very much apart from some closely monitored road funds (which are very efficiently applied), and some occasional specific purpose grant funding. It can only be assumed that there is some drive by the State Government to replicate the amalgamation scenario that has occurred in the other States of Australia. Many of these amalgamations have proved to be expensive and dysfunctional. Country communities have been disempowered to the extent that some are pursuing de-amalgamation in order to restore the economic and social capacity building and sense of local ownership that has been lost.

The dead hand of centralisation rarely achieves what it sets out to do. In fact, the Western Australian State Government itself has disaggregated some services that were previously centralised as they were found to be hopelessly expensive, inefficient and inadequate.

With few exceptions, local governments in Western Australia exercise sound management practices and financial control over their operations. This third tier of government is subject to much greater public scrutiny and transparency than its State and Federal Government counterparts which perhaps accounts for its solid collective performance and the consistent delivery of community based outcomes. Local control over local issues is not inefficient, nor is it expensive as most elected members in rural and remote areas give very generously of their time and effort. Furthermore many local governments with small populations underpin communities that manage some of the nation's major export industries.

Additionally, Shires in rural and remote areas provide the last bastion of community advocacy. They strongly represent their communities in advocating for the retention and/or improvement of medical, educational and policing services. They negotiate with State and Federal government departments on an ongoing basis and they seek out funding opportunities for community infrastructure projects.

They are represented by dedicated and respected community members, staff and at an executive level are led by competent, *multi skilled* CEO's.

The level of commitment and attention given to these smaller communities cannot be replicated through larger centralised models of local government. Indeed if smaller units of local governments are subsumed into larger regional type structures, the smaller towns will almost certainly *wither on the vine*.

Other points on the financial implications of amalgamations that need to be reinforced include:

1. There is little or no evidence to support the claim that larger Local Government is more cost efficient than small Local Government. Amalgamations that have already occurred in this State and in other States have not resulted in (unmandated) rate reductions or smaller rate increases. In fact there are examples of significantly higher rate increases occurring, post amalgamation.
2. Under the present arrangements governing Commonwealth Financial Assistance Grants and State Road Funds (Direct Grants) to Local Government, the grants payable to a new amalgamated entity would almost certainly be less than the collective grants paid to the former (pre amalgamated) local governments, thereby disadvantaging the community and placing a greater burden on the ratepayer.
3. Larger local governments sometimes defend their high rating levels because they are responding to the demands of their communities for more services. In the majority of smaller rural and remote local governments, *the main community priorities are good roads and good recreational facilities*. Most Council's deliver these core priorities in a very efficient and cost effective manner. These communities do not necessarily want, need, or demand the full suite of services offered by larger Councils that have to be funded by their ratepayers, *whether they like it or not*.
4. The cost of local government mergers is very high and has to be paid for by the State Government (i.e. the taxpayer) and/or the local governments concerned (i.e. the ratepayer).

It is irresponsible in the extreme for politicians to make unsubstantiated claims that medium and long term cost efficiencies will accrue through the creation of larger local governments when this has not been borne out in reality. *If these claims are to have any credibility, they need to be fully documented in black and white for all to see!* Successful corporations of any complexion do not implement long term, irreversible structural changes on a wing and a prayer and neither should the State Government of Western Australia when it is looking to "reform" local government.

At the very least, before any mergers are considered, a full cost benefit analysis should be undertaken and made available to the communities that will be impacted, in order that they may be informed of the financial implications of the proposed mergers or boundary changes.

Local Government, like the other tiers of Government, is subject to a constantly changing environment and structural changes may be initiated or imposed from time to time. Change should however be driven from within the sector and by the communities that make up our vast and diverse State.



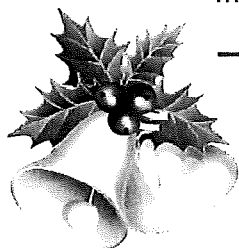

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended therefore that the following *non negotiable basic tenets* should be applied before any changes are made to the structure of Local Government in country and rural Western Australia:

- 1. Regardless of whether a proposed merger or boundary change is mooted or initiated by the State Government, a group of Councils or any other parties; the merger or boundary change be on the basis that the financial implications associated with such, be properly assessed, made publically available and communicated to the communities involved before being progressed further;*
- 2. That the poll provisions in the Local Government Act 1995 be amended so that electors of a Local Government where one or more local governments will be abolished or significantly affected by a boundary change proposal are able to demand a poll on the proposal.*

(Note: Proposal 2 mirrors the resolution carried by the WALGA State Council at its meeting on the 2nd July 2014)

Love promoted to Parliamentary Secretary position

This week's Cabinet reshuffle has seen Member for Moore Shane Love MLA promoted to the position of Parliamentary Secretary to Minister for Regional Development and Lands.

The position was left open with South West Region MLC Colin Holt's move into Cabinet, following the resignation of long-serving Minister Terry Waldron.

Mr Love and his family joined Cabinet members at Government House on Monday where he was sworn in by Her Excellency the Honourable Kerry Sanderson, Governor of Western Australia.

He said he was looking forward to the challenge of the new role and to working with Regional Development Minister Terry Redman.

"The Regional Development portfolio is enormously important to those living in the regions and it is much broader than the Royalties for Regions program," Mr Love said. "It involves bringing together all of the elements of government and private investment."

In the latest State Budget, the Royalties for Regions program was allocated \$1 billion per annum for the next four years.

Mr Love said since the program began in 2008, some \$5 billion had delivered more than 3,500 Royalties for Regions projects.

"And we are now entering a new phase with programs such as Growing our South which will deliver \$600 million over five years in the Wheatbelt, South West, Great Southern and Peel regions," he added.

"This is in addition to the Mid West Investment Plan which has seen more than \$61 million allocated to more than 23 major projects.

"These programs will be vital for the future delivery of many services in and beyond the Electorate of Moore."

ONLINE STRATEGY AND SMARTPHONE APP SET TO REVOLUTIONISE NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT IN THE REGION

9 December 2014

Community members, local and state government agency representatives, community group members and land holders with an interest in the environment have been given the first opportunity to view *NARvis*, a new interactive website that hosts the updated Regional Natural Resource Management Strategy for the Northern Agricultural Region of Western Australia.

The innovative resource has been developed by the Northern Agricultural Catchments Council (NACC), whose purpose is to support the community to support the natural environment.

NACC presented *NARvis* at four workshops held across the region, giving attendees from a broad range of backgrounds the opportunity to provide valuable input for the future of natural resource management in the region.

Attendees cited the interactive mapping capacity, ease of use and comprehensive nature of the website as among the most beneficial features.

One attendee from the Jurien Bay workshop stated that "*NARvis* will revolutionise how groups apply for funding and will be fundamental to success for grant applications from all groups".

The workshops also provided an overview on *Photomon*, a newly released and freely available smartphone app that can be used for environmental monitoring.

Photomon was originally developed with funding from Coastwest to assist with the monitoring of coastal erosion and other shoreline changes, including those posing a threat to coastal infrastructure. Future developments for the app are set to focus on its application in other diverse monitoring projects such as biodiversity and agriculture.

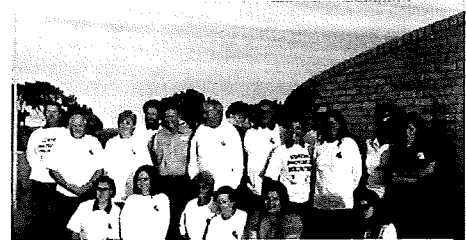
Jurien Bay played host to the largest of the four workshops which took place on 5th December and coincided with International Volunteer Day. Member for Moore, Shane Love, MLA, presented volunteers with a certificate of appreciation and a customised t-shirt to those involved with NACC's volunteer based Beach Monitoring Program.

NACC's Coastal and Marine Program Coordinator, Dr Mic Payne, commented that it was great to be able to formally recognise the contribution that volunteers have made to the Beach Monitoring Program and said "volunteer feedback has been crucial to the development of the smartphone app, and the program would not have been possible without the generous contribution of time and knowledge made by the volunteers".

Call for project proposals to boost WA biosecurity defences

Researchers, education institutions, producer groups and not-for-profit organisations are among those being encouraged to apply for Royalties for Regions funding before December 15 to help strengthen the State's biosecurity status.

The \$3.2 million Biosecurity Research and Development Fund offers annual support of between \$50,000 and \$500,000 for up to three years for projects focussing on pest and disease solutions in the agricultural and horticultural sectors.

Member for Moore Shane Love MLA said the fund – available through the recently announced \$20 million Royalties for Regions Boosting Biosecurity Defences initiative - would assist the state address and manage biosecurity risk and strategy into the future.

"Committing to fund further biosecurity measures was a key part of The Nationals WA \$300 million Seizing the Opportunity vision for agriculture policy leading in to the 2013 State election," he said.

"As part of that overall Royalties for Regions funding commitment the \$20 million Boosting Biosecurity Defences initiative will assist groups with a clear focus on extending WA's enviable biosecurity status."

Under Boosting Biosecurity Defences, a multitude of programs will be rolled out across the state to uphold and protect its reputation as being major pest and disease-free.

A key aspect of the initiative is to allow projects to be community-led, using local knowledge and innovation to foster research and development, educate communities about compliance with new laws, introduce new technology and encourage early detection of pests and disease.

Mr Love said the Biosecurity Research and Development Fund provided the perfect opportunity for stakeholders to address particular biosecurity risks to benefit their communities and the industry.

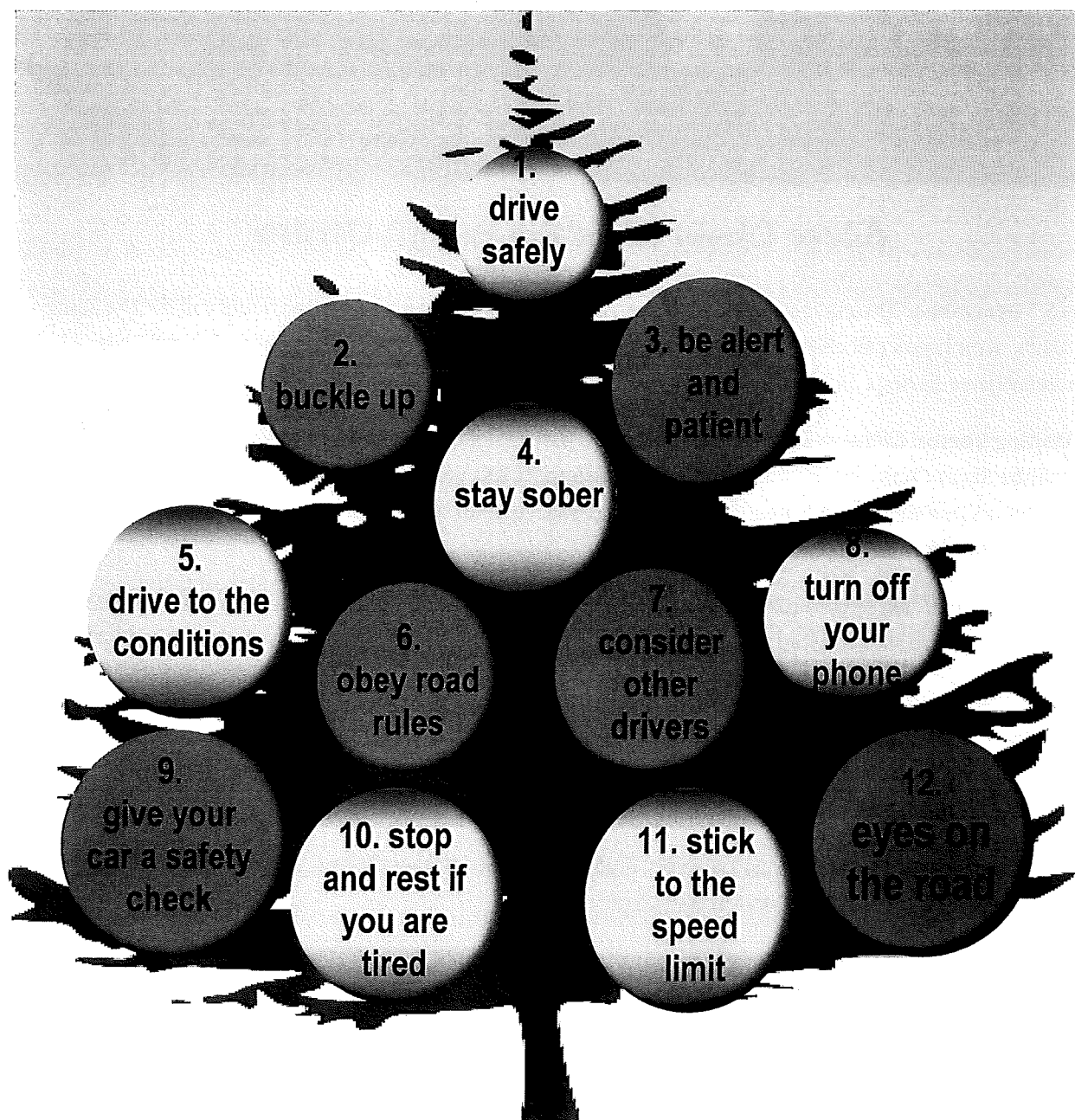
"I put the call out to any eligible project proponent in the field of biosecurity to submit a preliminary proposal by the December 15 deadline," he said.

"Projects protecting our agricultural sector will have long-term spin-offs for the industry and environment, enforce WA's brand as a primary producing state and strengthen trade and export opportunities."

Preliminary proposals are to be submitted by 9am on 15 December, 2014. Funding will be available from April 2015

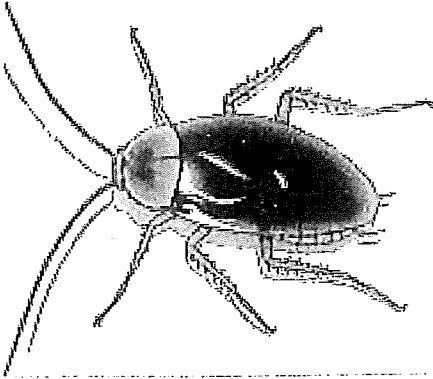

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Spaghetti with Anchovies, Broccoli and Chilli Flakes

Ingredients

1 head broccoli, broken into bite sized florets.
¼ cup best olive oil
8 anchovy fillets, chopped
1 tbsp sliced garlic
Good pinch chilli flakes
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
300g dried spaghetti
1 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese.

Method

Simmer the broccoli florets in salted water for 4 minutes or until they are just tender and then drain. Heat the oil in a large fry pan and add the anchovies, garlic and chilli flakes. Allow the anchovies to melt. Then add the broccoli back into the pan to heat through and season.

Meanwhile, cook the spaghetti in salted water until it is just tender, drain and add to the pan. Toss through until all is hot. Serve with a good scatter of cheese.

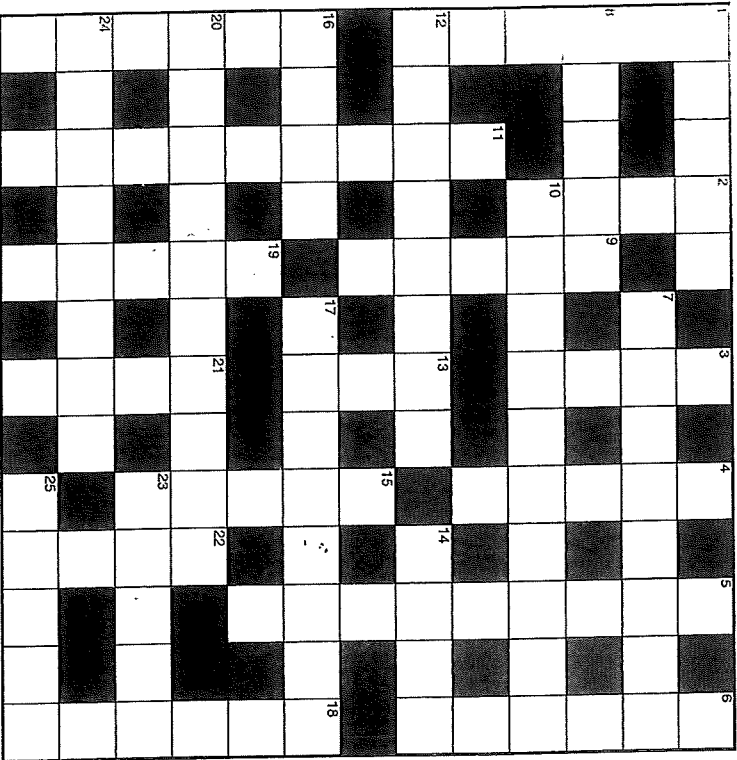

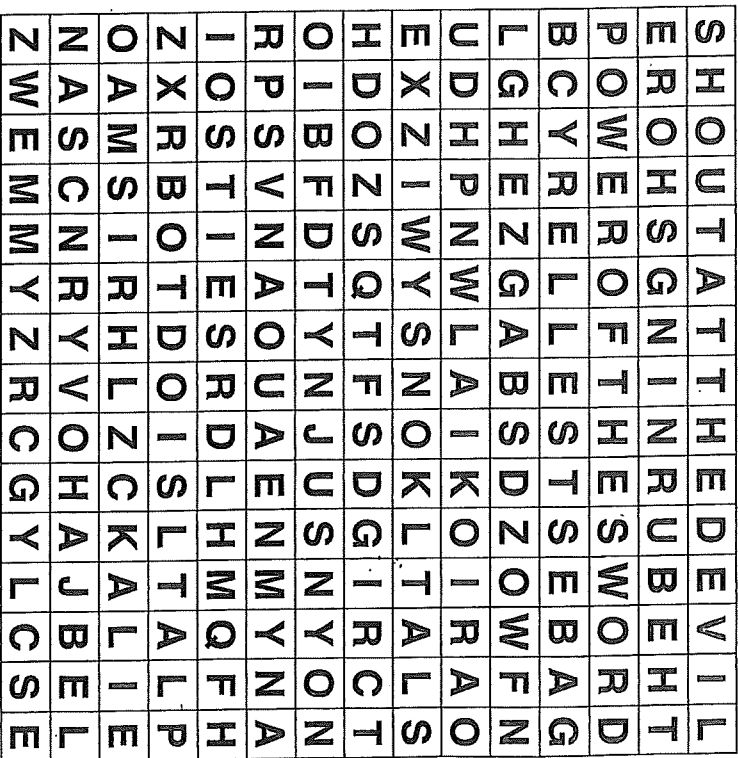

- ☐ 250g packet marshmallows, halved
- ☐ 100g packet dried cranberries
- ☐ 110g packet macadamia nuts, roughly chopped
- ☐ 60g pistachios (optional)
- ☐ 1/3 cup (35g) desiccated coconut
- ☐ 2 x 180g blocks good-quality white chocolate, chopped

Method

1. Grease a 20cm square cake pan. Line base and sides with baking paper, allowing a 2cm overhang on all sides.
2. Combine marshmallows, cranberries, nuts and coconut in a bowl. Place chocolate in a microwave safe bowl. Microwave on medium-high for 1-2 minutes, stirring with a metal spoon every 30 seconds, or until smooth.
3. Pour chocolate over marshmallow mixture. Mix well. Spoon mixture into prepared pan, pressing down with a spatula. Refrigerate for 2 hours or until set. Using a warm knife, cut into squares. Serve.
